Renzetti Fishing Fair: 4-5 Dec. Fly fishing's legendary anglers come to Titusville, FL, Saturday, Dec 4-5, for Renzetti's 5th Fly Fishing and Rod Building Fair. Lefty Kreh, Bob Clouser, Jon Cave, Bob Popovics, Nick Curcione, Flip Pallot and many others will give programs on and teach all aspects of the sport, including fly tying and fly casting. Rodsmiths John Stumpe, Curtis Baker will teach some technique in custom rod building and exhibit their work.


The 5th Fly Fishing and Rod Building Fair will be held at Renzetti's manufacturing facility, 8800 Grissom Pkwy, Titusville, FL on Friday, Dec 4, from 12 p.m to 4 p.m. and Saturday Dec 5, from 9 a.m to 3:30 p.m. The cost for this two-day event is \$25.00 advanced purchase. Chattooga River Trip: Six club members drove north about 9 hours to trout fish. We stayed in two cabins in the Oconee State Park in South Carolina. A 14-day S Carolina license was \$14. We fished the delayed harvest section for three days by Highway 28 and fished up river for one day. Weather was great with cool mornings in the 30's and nice afternoons. We caught rainbows, browns and exceptionally beautiful brook trout. A two-fly rig worked well with a nymph tied about a foot behind a Woolly Bugger or other larger fly. The Chattooga is a National wild and scenic river and lives up to its name. The medium sized river with tricky footing on slippery rocks made for careful wading; a wading staff helped greatly. You can fish the Chattooga all winter and it will be great on mild days between fronts. Ted caught a trophy wild rainbow on the last day of about 18 inches. Thanks to Ted for organizing the trip and showing us how and where to fish.

St Johns River Shad Outing: 8-10 Jan. This is an annual trip for club members. We will camp out on a beautiful private site near Sanford, FL and fish Friday through Sunday. Tips for TBFFC

JAWOROWSKI ON CASTING – “I am never impressed on how far a person can cast. I am more concerned with how hard (or how easily) they work to achieve it. Long casting is not necessarily good casting.” And, “Line speed is the heart and soul of fly casting.” And, “Don’t think in terms of casting harder or giving more power. It’s all a matter of efficiency.” P.S. I bought Jaworowski’s book on casting and will bring it to the next meeting for someone to borrow.

Random Thoughts from the Tying Bench

WATCH THE BIRDS – Birds are predators. Have you ever watched herons or large egrets stalking baitfish? That’s the way to be successful when you are fishing shallow, saltwater flats. Don’t splash around or wave you rod overhead and scare off every fish on the flat. Make long casts when searching the flats under clear, calm conditions. I have been told, but cannot prove, that when the Pelicans are sitting on the surface and feeding by dipping in the water they are on Glass Minnows. When they a flying up and diving back immediately they are on Scaled Sardines. And when they make those high, deep dives they are on Herrings. In any case, the birds will tell you where schools of baitfish are. Whether or not game fish are also on the bait is the question. At any rate, You can learn a lot about where the bait are by watching the birds. And you should be fishing where the bait is. Why are those birds just sitting on the water instead of sunning themselves on the beach? Could they be expecting a school of bait to come up near the top of the water column?

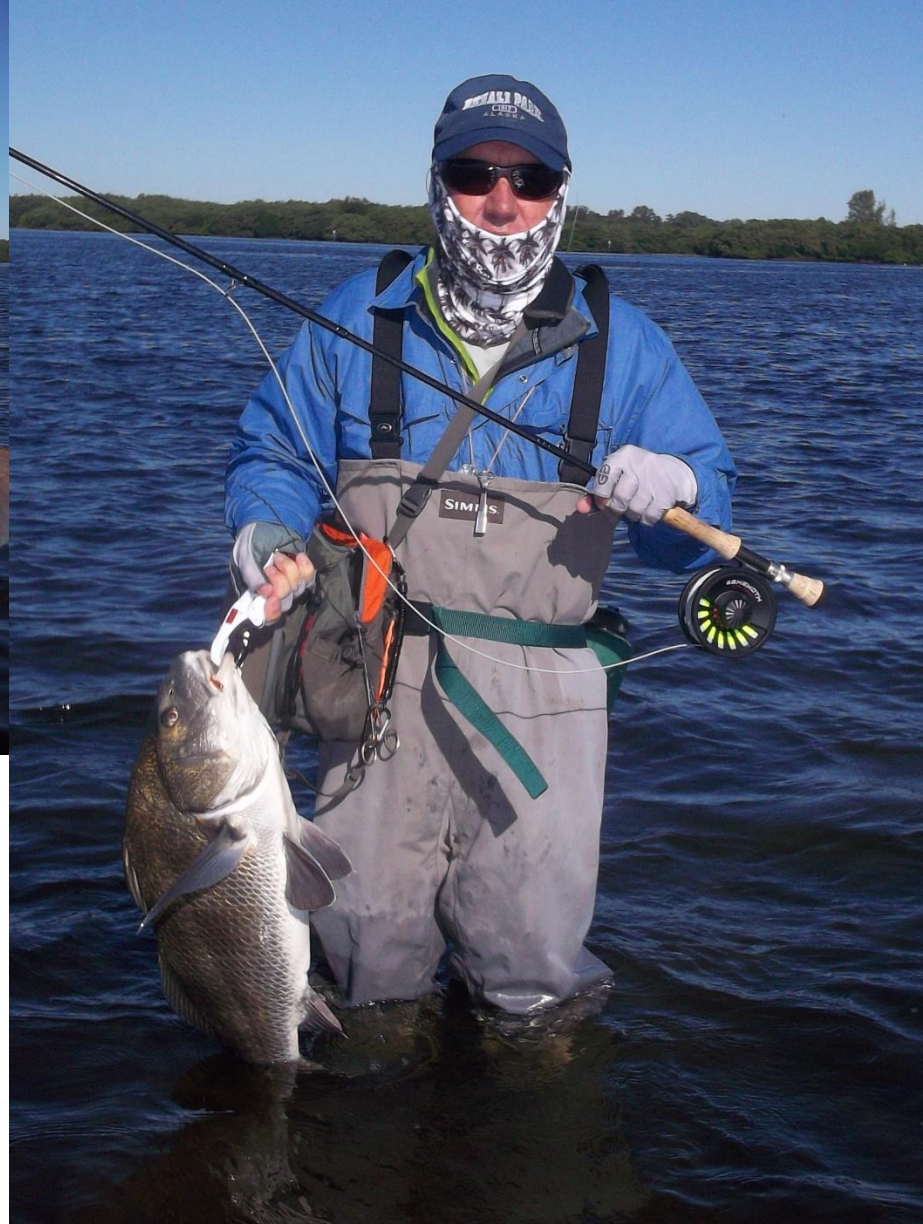

Fishing Report and Forecast

“What a great time to go fishing!”

Capt Pat Damico provides this report from his Captain’s Corner:

I was asked a great question recently: "There are tons of baitfish everywhere; where will they take my fly?" A good answer this time of year is to find concentrations of fish actively feeding. Lighted docks and bridges provide the answer. Take advantage of strong outgoing tides and hit the lighted areas before daylight. When you see snook, reds, trout and occasionally baby tarpon chasing baitfish, cast your white-baitfish pattern up-tide of the activity and eliminate any slack line as soon as it touches the surface. Long casts are an advantage to avoid spooking fish. Keep the rod tip close to the water. Use a strip set to hook the fish only when you feel the strike. If you react to the fish's movement, you often will pull the fly away. If this happens and you haven't lifted the rod, the fly is still in the strike zone and will entice another attempt by the missed fish or one of its buddies. Use 25-pound test shock tippet on an 8-weight rod to prevent broken leaders from snook and tarpon. As daylight approaches, lengthen or change your leader and use a 15-pound fluorocarbon tippet. Attach a crab pattern or Gurgler-style floater and look for tailing redfish as the water thins on your favorite redfish flat. Orient the fish's position and place the fly in front of its nose.

Capt Rick Grassett reports action with tripletail, false albacore and Spanish mackerel should be a good option now in the coastal gulf when conditions allow it. Snook fishing around lighted docks and bridges with flies and DOA Lures should also be a good option. Look for reds, snook and big trout mixed with mullet schools on shallow flats and edges of bars in backcountry areas of Charlotte Harbor and lower Tampa Bay.

Fishing Report and Forecast, cont.

Kayak guide Neil Taylor suggests the cooler weather will dictate where the best fishing will be this time of year, so success comes to those who pay attention to the changing weather conditions. If conditions are mild and consistent for a few days in a row, the fish may be roaming their normal locations. When the water temperature plummets, savvy anglers adjust to the conditions. Among the most crucial adjustments is selecting the fishing location. Water on the open flats can get cold, so the canals, rivers, creeks or the out flows near power plants become better target locations. Hope for a mild December but be ready to "go where the fish are" if things start to really change.

Club member Dave Eddy has this to say: I can't report anything noteworthy in the fishing dept, but have hit my goal of actually fooling a saltwater fish to take my fly. My thanks to you and Steve Parker for patiently encouraging me, gracefully ignoring my incompetence and showing me the ropes. My rod/reel would likely be gathering dust without you two

I've been wading off Picnic Island Park and working the incoming tide just off the stone jetty. I had my first hit here and it was a jolt - but such a surprise I gave the fish all day to spit out the fly: half a minute later, he did. At Indian Shores beach I've been working the tides and can report fish have been active, particularly on the outgoing tide. Two weeks ago it was like fishing in Louisiana - you could see the birds working just inside the sand bar. When fortune smiled and they moved closer, the bait could be seen boiling the water and I had my first opportunity to cast with a specific landing zone in mind. Finally a lady fish agreed to christen my rod - nothing for the newsletter but great fun for a newbie.

Walt and Ted found a few tailing reds and black drum on the low incoming tide at McDill last week. The fish were cruising the flat around grass beds and poking around for crabs and shrimp. The reds and drum ate an Avalon shrimp fly and Ted got a snook on a spoon fly. The three reds were about 5 pounds and the two drum about 9 pounds. Seek out flats you can fish with N/NE winds this winter on low new and full moon tides for good sight fishing.
